Goal. Increase working lands’ resilience to extreme events and a changing climate by building a community of agricultural professionals and partners that can help to implement climate informed conservation practices.

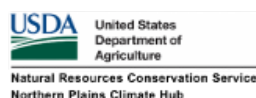
Objective 1. Increase the knowledge and confidence of participants to enable more effective use and communication of weather and climate resources.

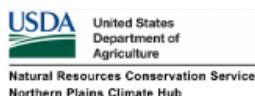

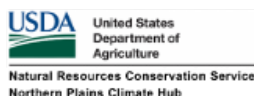

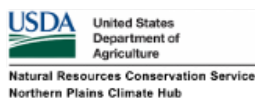
